This LB Richmond upon Thames SACRE Annual Report is presented in the new format developed by NASACRE in conjunction with the DfE for use from September 2021.

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#### 1. Introduction

#### 1.1 Foreword from the Chair of SACRE 2020-21

Each year, when I write the foreword to our SACRE Annual Report, I take the opportunity to give my heartfelt thanks to all the members of the SACRE team for their commitment to the delivery of RE in our schools, and to acknowledge the blend of friendship, understanding and honest sharing of faith perspectives which makes our work so distinctive, and such a pleasure to chair.

Following the hard work put in by SACRE members to deliver our Revised RE Syllabus for our community schools, it was disappointing that we have not been able to launch it with a public event, as was possible in the pre-Covid days. However, we were grateful to our RE consultant, Lesley Prior, for her excellent training to accompany the circulation of the Revised Syllabus to our schools. It was good to hear the very positive feedback from the many teachers who were able to attend this virtual event.



The Annual Report gives a flavour of some of the important topics we have considered, such as the Ofsted challenge on the nature of knowledge, and we have been kept closely in touch with what is happening in our primary schools through the Primary RE Network, and presentations from some of our primary teachers explaining how they approach the teaching of RE using the Revised Syllabus. We have many further projects in the pipeline for the coming year.

I record my thanks to two special people who provide the solid foundation for all the work that our SACRE undertakes – our splendid consultant Lesley Prior, whose drive and determination for keeping RE in the forefront of our schools is so important for its success. And our clerk Joanne Tutt, whose attention to detail and thoughtful follow up ensures the success of our meetings throughout the year.

As I write, we remain in that strange new world of virtual meetings and electronic communication, and missing the warmth of round-table discussions. But the number of members of our SACRE continues to grow, the commitment and friendship of our group is undiminished, and soon we will be able to meet face to face again.

### 2. Religious Education Statutory Responsibilities

#### 2.1 Background

The London Borough of Richmond upon Thames' Standing Advisory Council on Religious Education (SACRE) is required, in accordance with Section 391(6) of the Education Act 1996, to publish an annual report on its activities. This report summarises its activities during the academic year 2020-21. Its current terms of reference, as laid down by the Education Reform Act 1998, are: "to advise the authority upon such matters connected with religious worship in county schools and the religious education to be given in accordance with an agreed syllabus as the authority may refer to the council or as the council may see fit."

In particular, the SACRE is charged with the following responsibilities:

- It can require the authority to review the Agreed Syllabus on Religious Education.
- It may determine, on application by the headteacher that the requirement for Collective Worship in community schools to be wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian character shall not apply to the Collective Worship provided for some or all of its pupils in a particular school.
- With the authority, to review the support offered for RE teaching, the methods of teaching employed, and teachers' in-service professional development.

In addition, the SACRE has a direct role in the consideration and disposal of complaints related to the RE curriculum or Collective Worship. The SACRE will be asked to advise where complaints relate to Religious Education given in accordance with the locally agreed syllabus or to Collective Worship in county – now called community – schools maintained by the LA.

#### 2.2 Locally Agreed Syllabus

Official

By statute, every local authority is required to adopt a Locally Agreed Syllabus (LAS) for Religious Education and to review it every five years. The current LB Richmond upon Thames LAS has been in place since February 2020 after undergoing a rigorous process of review and revision.

### 2.3 Standards in RE

SACRE members give close consideration to the various national and local developments concerning the provision of RE. Their discussions are prompted by the information provided to the SACRE through the regular updates from teacher members, the RE Consultant and SACRE Adviser and NASACRE Briefings. During 2020-21, SACRE gave particular attention to:

 a publication by Insight UK in relation to the state of Hinduism in RE within UK Schools and noted its findings, while also being clear that the draft of the new LAS requires that aspects of Hinduism should be taught at every stage of education (except where a school's own choices in relation to publicly accredited examination syllabus may prevent this) - the report can be read here:

 The recommendation in the Final Report of the Commission on Religious Education, that SACREs should be replaced with Local Advisory Networks for Religion and Worldviews' (LANs). Richmond SACRE was a volunteer member of a pilot project looking at the possible implementation of LANs and had been asked specifically to look at issues around membership. Therefore at the October 2020 SACRE meeting, members had a productive discussion on their personal experiences of being SACRE members. The final report of the pilot project can be read here:

The key findings from both of these reports have also been analysed and evaluated by members of the RE Networks and their implications for planning teaching and learning considered with care.

#### 2.4 Teacher Training

A Good Practice Network for Subject Leaders for RE in community primary schools (in both LB Richmond upon Thames and RB Kingston upon Thames) continued to run on a termly basis in 2020-21. These sessions are led by Lesley Prior, RE Consultant and Adviser to the SACRE. Occasionally SACRE members are able to be present too and play a key role in building effective links between SACRE and the members of this group.

The RE Subject Leaders in community primary schools have met three times this year. Due to restrictions and safety precautions related to Covid-19, all of these meetings in 2020-21 were held via virtual platforms.

The Primary RE Network continues to grow in size and many members maintain constant and mutually supportive contact with one another between sessions using a WhatsApp Group. This initiative has been warmly welcomed, with questions being raised, materials recommended and documentation shared. As the restrictions imposed by Covid-19 prevented face to face meetings during this period, the support offered was hugely appreciated by all those involved.

Lesley Prior (the RE Consultant and Adviser to SACRE) offers extensive telephone and online consultations to Subject Leaders who are developing schemes of learning and reviewing and revising policy documents for RE. Lesley also issued six newsletters during this period (one every half term) for distribution to Primary Subject Leaders for RE to share new materials and resources, promote relevant RE events and highlight significant national developments and initiatives in the subject. SACRE members also receive these newsletters.

A further training session on the new LAS is scheduled for September 2021.

#### 2.5 Complaints and Withdrawals

There have been no complaints to SACRE in 2020-21 in relation to Religious Education.

SACRE has received no reports of pupils being withdrawn from Religious Education in 2020-21.

#### 3. Collective Worship Statutory Responsibilities

#### 3.1. Standards and Monitoring of Collective Worship

During 2020-21 the SACRE Adviser continued to offer advice and support on Collective Worship to staff in schools who have requested this.

#### 3.2 Determinations

The Adviser to SACRE regularly reminds members about the role, nature and purpose of determinations in relation to Collective Worship. A determination lifts the requirement for the majority of the statutory daily Acts of Collective Worship in these schools to be "wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian character".

No LA maintained schools in LB Richmond upon Thames have ever applied to SACRE for a determination.

The Adviser to SACRE can offer support with this process on request.

#### 3.3 Other Information

There have been no complaints to SACRE in 2020-21 in relation to Collective Worship.

SACRE has received no reports of pupils being withdrawn from Collective Worship in 2020-21.

#### 4. Links with other Bodies

LB Richmond upon Thames SACRE is affiliated to The National Association of SACREs (NASACRE) and notes and discusses key points from its regular briefings.

#### 7.1 GCSE & A Level Religious Studies Results 2021

The government cancelled all public examinations at Key Stage 4 and 5 again in 2021 due to the Covid 19 pandemic. Students were awarded grades through the Teacher Assessed Grades (TAG) process. Teachers in LB Richmond upon Thames schools used a range of evidence to award grades to students. These grades will not be published but an overview of the number of entries for GCSE and A level has been included below.
