# Standing Advisory Council for Religious Education (RE) Annual Report 2023-2024 Southend-on-Sea City Council

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#### **SECTION 1: CHAIR'S INTRODUCTION**

I am delighted, as Chair of Southend City's Standing Advisory Council on Religious Education (SACRE), to introduce this report as we reflect on another year. I would like to offer my thanks to our SACRE members, as well as the teachers and key stakeholders who have worked so hard to support Religious Education (RE) across Southend City Council in the year 2023/24 covered by this report.

As we have launched our new Agreed Syllabus this year, I am pleased to commend it to our schools as it provides a robust framework for teaching RE. It ensures high standards of learning and fosters pupilsfull' potential in the subject. By incorporating RE into the basic curriculum, it reaffirms its essential role in shaping well-rounded education for all learners. The RE Syllabus is vitally important to prepare children and young people in the city of Southend for life in a twenty-first century world, and understanding religious and non-religious worldviews plays a central role in local and global affairs.

Religious Education supports our pupils in exploring matters of faith and belief, but also ethical and philosophical positions within religious and non-religious views. The study of RE allows the learner to use and develop analytical skills, criticism and summation of texts, critical thinking skills, moral evaluation of contemporary issues, and the application of philosophical thinking. It also develops broader reading, writing and oral debating skills, leading to improved literacy levels. Lower ability candidates do better in RE GCSE than their overall subject averages. Students of all abilities, who study RE and have a broad curriculum, show improvement in overall individual results, as borne out by exam data analysis. Religious Education not only supports overall increased attainment but also informs a world view in an increasingly global age. This New Agreed Syllabus for RE sets out what should be studied in RE and offers clear advice and guidance on how this can be done so that pupils can develop a coherent understanding of religions and non-religious beliefs, and world views.

Against our positive background for RE, it is disappointing to note that entries into public examinations in some settings are lower than the national average. Also of concern is the reduced number of RE specialists entering the teaching profession and the reduction in school RE staffing. The amount of curriculum time within school timetables devoted to RE is not, in some cases, providing pupils with the depth and breadth of knowledge they need to live in a complex world. These are the challenges that SACRE, schools and key stakeholders will continue to address.

I would like to thank the retiring RE Advisor Frances Neil for her work over the last number of years and acknowledge in particular her support of school RE subject leaders and teachers through her teachers' training network.

I look forward, on behalf of SACRE, to working with our advisors from RE Today during the forthcoming academic year as they undertake the role of leading Religious Education on behalf of Southend City Council. They will be guiding us through the development of our locally Agreed Syllabus as we take on the challenge of ensuring all pupils across Southend on Sea continue to have access to a rigorous and challenging RE curriculum.

#### INFORMATION ABOUT SACRE

### 1.1 Duty to establish a SACRE

Since the Education Reform Act of 1988, all Local Authorities (LAs) have been required by law to constitute a Standing Advisory Council for Religious Education (SACRE) within their local area (1).

#### 1.2 What does a SACRE do?

SACRE is a unique body; it is set up by the LA but is independent of it, with the role to give advice to that LA. The law states that Religious Education must be taught in all maintained schools (2) and a SACRE's role is to advise what needs to be done to improve religious education (RE) and collective worship for schools in its area. The main purpose of the annual report is to hold the LA to account, by informing the Secretary of State and key partners what advice SACRE gave the LA during the year and how the LA responded to that advice. This includes advice on Religious Education and Collective Worship in those schools for which the LA has responsibility.

# 1.4 Membership of SACRE



#### 1.5 SACRE Functions

- To advise the LA on collective worship and the Religious Education to be given in accordance with the agreed syllabus including methods of teaching, advice on materials and the provision of training for teachers
- To consider whether to recommend to the LA that its current agreed syllabus should be reviewed by convening an Agreed Syllabus Conference.
- To consider whether the requirement that religious worship in a county school should be 'broadly Christian in nature' should be varied (determinations).
- To report to the LA and the Department for Education (DfE) on its activities on an annual basis.

#### 1.7 Meetings and attendance

SACRE met during the academic year 2023-2024:

- Thursday, 23rd November, 2023. At Committee Room 2 Civic Suite, Civic Centre
- Tuesday 24th January 2024 at 2pm Southend Agreed Syllabus Conference

During 2023-2024, there were difficulties around meetings taking place on a termly basis, for example around being quorate. This has now been addressed through the review of the SACRE Constitution and Membership, as outlined below.

Minutes of all SACRE meeting and the current membership are available from the Southend-on-Sea City Council website.

Key priorities for SACRE included:

- A review of the SACRE Constitution and Membership be undertaken, including a review of the latest census data, with a view to providing a refreshed and revised Constitution and membership to a future meeting for consideration.
- Completion of the SACRE Self-Assessment Tool aimed at supporting SACREs with a focus
  on the areas outlined below. The SACRE Self-Assessment Tool is endorsed and used as the
  basis to evaluate its needs and priorities and areas of development for the 2023/24 academic
  year:
  - 1. Management of the SACRE.
  - 2. Promoting improvement in the standards, the quality of teaching and provision in RE.
  - 3. Evaluating the effectiveness of the locally agreed syllabus.
  - 4. Promoting improvement in the provision and quality of collective worship. Public Document Pack

5. Contributing to cohesion across the community and the promotion of social and racial harmony.

The SACRE discussed and commented on each of the key areas of assessment and broadly supported the proposed ratings and the evidence set out against each key area.

# SECTION 2: STANDARDS AND QUALITY OF PROVISION FOR RELIGIOUS EDUCATION IN 2023/24

### 2.1 Activities undertaken by SACRE

SACRE monitors the quality of provision for religious education in a number of ways:

- RE Lead network meetings delivered by the RE Lead
- Review of Ofsted reports by the Head of School Performance and Provision and her team
- Website monitoring
- Engagement by schools in networking, learning and development opportunities
- GCSE results analysis
- Recruitment and vacancies for RE through for example 'Southend Jobs in Schools'
- Evidence around any withdrawals from RE and Collective Worship and freedom of information requests.

The RE Adviser reports to SACRE on a termly basis, and to the Services to Schools Team Manager.

# 2.2 Monitoring of School Provision and meeting learning and development needs

During this period, the RE Lead met at least termly with school RE leaders from across the city. Most work was focussed on the new syllabus to ensure a smooth and successful roll out. All schools irrespective of designation requested a licence and a copy of the new syllabus from RE today on behalf of SACRE. This included: 36 academy schools,1 Free School, 9 LA maintained schools. The RE Lead acted as the first point of contact for schools around RE questions and support; this came from across the key stages and settings. The main focus has been support for subject leads. The RE lead has delivered learning and development to Governors through the Governance Leadership Programme on the new syllabus, importance of RE and key national updates. The duties of schools regarding RE are promoted through strong relationships with the authority's school performance service.

**SECTION 4: STANDARDS AND QUALITY OF PROVISION FOR COLLECTIVE WORSHIP** Support is available to schools around Collective Worship (CW) through the RE Lead. Information is shared from credible sources such as RE Today with RE leads at network, learning and development opportunities.

### **Monitoring Collective Worship**

This is through RE Lead network structures and monitoring for example of Ofsted reports. For example, these may refence collective worship in relation to evidencing that a school is promoting children's development, skills and wellbeing.

There have been no complaints about Collective Worship in schools submitted to SACRE.

#### **SECTION 6: DETERMINATIONS**

No requests for determination have been submitted to SACRE and there are no current determinations for review.

#### **SECTION 7: LINKS WITH OTHER BODIES**

- The SACRE Advisor has close relationships with schools and settings
- Some SACRE members have well established links with NASACRE
- Some of the SACRE members have hosted school visits to their places of worship throughout the year and engaged with visits to external places of worship.

#### 7.1 Links with other Authorities and SACREs

The RE Adviser retains strong links with peers in wider authorities and SACREs through RE Today and NASACRE opportunities.

#### 7.2 NASACRE

• Southend SACRE is a member of NASACRE and NASACRE bulletins are circulated to all SACRE members by the Clerk. These bulletins are also shared with RE Leads and information shared in the council's 'Education Newsletter'.

• Some SACRE members have attended a NASACRE learning and development events during the year.

# SECTION 8: SACRE'S CONTRIBUTION TO SUPPORTING SCHOOLS THROUGH EVENTS AND TRAINING

SACRE continues to be responsive to the needs of teachers and RE leads across in Southend. This is outlined above, led by the RE Adviser. It has included offers to teachers and school leaders. A bespoke session was around the launch of the new curriculum took place in the summer term and was well attended by schools with positive feedback. This was a joint delivery model between the RE Adviser, School Performance Adviser and RE Today. It also served as a smooth handover between provider for the RE lead transition.

# **SECTION 9: SACRE'S OWN ARRANGEMENTS**

- During this period SACRE has reviewed and updated the constitution.
- •For this there was consultation with members from each group of SACRE, and any recommendations were approved by the full SACRE.
