Section 1: Chair's introduction and context

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Words from the Chair – Mrs S Forbes

The St. Helens SACRE is pleased to present its annual report, highlighting yet another successful year of achievement and progress in promoting effective religious education and collective worship across the borough. Over the past year, SACRE has maintained a robust engagement by convening three times annually using a hybrid approach, fostering collaboration and dialogue among key stakeholders.

The termly SACRE Spotlight continues to be a valuable resource, providing essential local and national updates regarding religious education and collective worship to headteachers, RE teachers, and Primary RE leads.

The SACRE has readopted the Lancashire Locally Agreed Syllabus, thereby fortifying the foundation of religious education in our schools. Looking ahead, training sessions are scheduled for the new year, specifically tailored for Primary School RE leads, ensuring that educators are well-equipped to deliver high-quality religious education in their classrooms.

Our key priorities from last year's report were as follows:

Key priority 1: To improve attendance at SACRE meetings.

The memberships were reviewed and the clerk wrote to those who had poor attendance to outline the expectation of the SACRE. This continues to be a target for the SACRE although more members are now opting for the hybrid virtual attendance which has increased attendance at the meetings. The meeting dates are now recorded on the council website.

Key priority 2: Members attend NASACRE conference / training

All new members have been signposted to the NASACRE training. We continue to be members of NASACRE. Catherine Hughes works alongside NASACRE to deliver CPD as well as helping to organise

the Annual Conference. The chair and SACRE facilitator have also attended the North West SACRE meetings.

OFSTED Trail 2023/24

St Helens SACRE – OFSTED Report's 2023-24

In 2023 – 24, 20 schools / educational establishments (including residential and the council) in St Helens were inspected by OFSTED. Here are examples in the OFSTED reports of statements linking to Religious Education, collective worship and British Values:

Rivington Primary School (March 2024)

Pupils benefit from a wealth of remarkably considered experiences that help to prepare them exceptionally well for life in modern Britain. For example, they discuss and consider topical issues with deep understanding and empathy. These conversations are captured on the school podcast and shared across classes and with families. This provides an effective model for how to discuss and debate issues respectfully. Pupils have an impressive understanding of equality. They fully respect differences between themselves and others.

Bleak Hill Primary School (April 2024)

Pupils take pride in winning the attendance bears that are presented by pupil 'attendance activists' each week during collective worship.

They recognise that these opportunities, alongside their learning about diversity and difference, prepare them well for the world outside of the classroom. The school's rich offer provides the knowledge and skills that pupils need to become successful and active citizens of modern-day Britain.

Merton Bank (May 2024)

Pupils understand the school's values and fundamental British values clearly. They spoke with maturity about their knowledge of democracy and individual liberty. Pupils have an honest and tolerant approach to the differences between people, including religion and race.

Allanson Street Primary (May 2024)

Well-considered opportunities help to prepare pupils for life in modern Britain.

Pupils learn about different religions and have an appreciation of everyone's uniqueness.

Mill Green School (May 2024)

Pupils also learn about life in modern Britain and what it means to have a positive relationship.

Robins Lane Community Primary School (July 2024)

Pupils learn about the differences between people, including different religions and faiths. They are respectful towards others who may have different beliefs, cultures or backgrounds. Pupils take great pride in their school and its community. They are well prepared to grow up in modern Britain.
