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1. Report from the Chair of SACRE - Carolyn Lindsay



Religious Education has never been more important than now.

"The timing of the Ofsted report on Religious Education (Research and analysis)

Research review series: religious education Published 12 May 2021), sends a powerful message to all those with an interest in the status of RE. As only the second subject review after science and the first Arts and Humanities subject in the schedule, it is a clear indication of the importance of Religious Education as a discrete subject, and the need for a broad and balanced curriculum.

"The review spells out the essential role that RE plays in every young person's academic and personal development and emphasises the value that an education in religious and non-religious worldviews provides in later life."

As Katie Freeman, Chair, National Association of Teachers of RE states "The need for high quality teaching in all schools for all pupils, both from an academic perspective and for each pupil's personal development, is abundantly clear in the Ofsted report. "It sends out a strong reminder to all school leaders of the requirement to teach the subject at all key stages, including sixth form, and to consider the professional development and subject knowledge needed for teachers to deliver a high quality RE curriculum."

Attendance at Religious Education training and at our Network meetings indicates that Religious Education continues to thrive in the London Borough of Tower Hamlets (LBTH). Where national figures demonstrate that declining numbers of schools are offering RE at GCSE over that last 4 years, the overwhelming majority of schools in Tower Hamlets enter all their students for the full course. What is more pleasing is that, on average our schools achieve scores that exceed those for the subject nationally.

Tower Hamlets SACRE continues to grow and represents all the major religious traditions and non-religious worldviews. We are an active and supportive committee who have, despite Covid-19, continued to meet online since our planned Face to Face meetings with schools have been halted. However many of our committee members are based in schools so we are still in touch with education in Tower Hamlets and have been planning our future engagement with all our schools. LBTH SACRE is currently exploring a sustainable infrastructure to ensure its continued success for the future.

Over the last 3 years we have been fortunate to benefit from funding from Tower Hamlets Community Cohesion Fund. This allowed us to provide a wide range of training for schools focusing upon Islam, Christianity, Judaism, Hinduism, Sikhism as well as non-religious world views. The funding has also meant we could procure training and support for Subject Leaders and Senior Leaders so that we can ensure children in Tower Hamlets are offered the very best Religious Education available. This support has been hugely popular and very well received. Tower Hamlets now has a strong network of Subject Leaders who have established a Trello RE Network which meets informally to support the development of RE in schools. The Network is ever-growing and it is good to see such a strong group developing.

Unfortunately, funding was ceased in 2020 but we are looking forward to working with those who have now been given responsibility for building on the achievements so far, recognising that there is still much to do.

THEP and LBTH will be funding a RE Teachers conference to support the teaching of RE in our Primary and Secondary Schools as well as our launch of LBTH RE Agreed Syllabus 2022-2027.

An example of the excellent work carried out to support schools is the LBTH SACRE Ramadan Guidance handbook developed for teachers, carers and parents, in partnership with the London Muslim Centre and the Tower Hamlets Council of Mosques. This work was led by Juber Hussain (Vice Chair), Fiona Shaik Umar, Wahida Begum and Deborah Weston (RE Advisor/Inspector) who they have collectively drafted the guidance for LBTH schools relating to Ramadan. We have received feedback from schools and will be reviewing it to guide schools and families in 2022-23.

The recent LBTH SACRE RE Survey would imply that our schools are actively teaching and promoting RE. There are a variety of models and we celebrate that schools are personalising the delivery of the Agreed Syllabus so that it is aspirational and meets the needs of Tower Hamlets pupils. An emerging feature in many of our schools is 'Interfaith Week' where despite Covid restrictions saw a range of outside speakers either virtually or face to face sharing their faiths with our children.

SACRE has recently produced and adopted guidance for schools 'Schools Worship Guidance and Acts of Worship for LBTH'.

The Covid 19 pandemic has had an impact on SACRE's work in schools however we continue to endeavour circumvent the restrictions by holding meetings and training online. In the meantime Tower Hamlets Education Partnerships have provided access for all schools to the RE Today online lessons to be used during the pandemic. The recovery curriculum for 2021-22 in RE has been developed and schools are ensuring that any lost learning is being addressed

Some of our next steps for 2021-23 are to focus on Succession Planning for LBTH SACRE, to develop assessment in RE and consider how places of faith and belief in Tower Hamlets can support the teaching and learning in RE.

I wish to acknowledge the immense support received from Deborah Weston, RE advisor for Tower Hamlets, the clerk to SACRE and the SACRE Committee who make the role interesting and challenging. Finally I wish to extend a huge thank-you to the schools and their staff who help to make Religious Education a high profile subject relevant to the children attending LBTH schools.

This annual report will give you a flavour of the work of Tower Hamlets SACRE including our achievements and areas to develop.

During the year, action was taken to find people to fill vacancies in several groups with the effect that the membership of SACRE now better reflects the diversity of religions and worldviews in the local community.

4. Advice and information offered to the local authority and schools

4.1 Local Developments

- The Ofsted Research Review for Religious Education was published 2021
- The NASACRE Report on SACRE funding 2021
- Hinduism in Religious Education in UK schools 2021

4.3 Professional Development for teachers of RE

SACRE was able to share the following opportunities for teacher training in LBTH

- RE Today Programme: During the academic year, SACRE received regular reports from Carolyn Lindsay about this LBTH funded programme. The programme included several elements including a continuation of the successful Ambassadors of Faith and Belief Programme which involved students in year 12 of LBTH schools being trained to speak to primary school children as Ambassadors for a specific religious or non-religious worldview. Training for primary teachers of RE to increase their subject knowledge and ability to lead the subject in their school and a pupil teacher conference.

4.4 Resources for the teaching of RE

SACRE carried out the following exercises in relation to religious education and acts of collective worship

 summary of the findings was shared with schools. SACRE also shared a document produced by
 NATRE with descriptors for the types of material that can be shared on school websites in
 relation to RE. The document rates the activities as bronze, silver, and gold levels of practice.
- Virtual Visits to places of worship.

During the year, SACRE worked on extending the resources available to support RE through visits to places of worship and other significant venues. A resource had been produced to introduce the London Buddhist Centre and one that focused on Christianity called Living Faith, Diwali at the Gurdwara Sikh Sangat. Further resources are planned. 

5. Monitoring of Standards

5.1 GCSE entries and results

The Covid 19 pandemic has resulted in severe disruption to the teaching of public examination courses. In recognition of this, the government has decided not to produce school level performance data. Local Authority level data have been published however -see below:

It is pleasing to read that not only are entry rates and attainment at grades 9-4 above the national average but pupils match or exceed the national average in attainment 8 scores and EBacc Average Point Scores in a range of subjects, despite scoring highly on deprivation measures such as entitlement to Free School Meals. Tower Hamlets has the 5th highest rate of entry 72.3 (out of 151) in the country.

5.2 School workforce Data

The table in appendix A represents information about the allocation of teachers to provision for Religious Education in Tower Hamlets as indicated from the census completed in November 2019 and published in the summer of 2020.

In a discussion about the school workforce data above, SACRE asked the local authority to note and investigate the following schools, mindful that in some cases, it was clear that errors had been made in the input of data.

i. St Paul's Way, Swanlea School and Morpeth School – no provision reported in year 11. GCSE is taken in year 10

- ii. George Green's School continues to report no provision in year 7-8 and minimal provision in years 10-11
- iii. Wapping High School– no provision reported in any year group.
- iv. London Enterprise Academy and Mulberry UTC re now reporting provision in the appropriate year groups
