1. Introduction

1.1. Preface by the Chair

We started the beginning of the school year feeling positive on how the RE network for teachers had developed during 2022-23 and was now able to make an impact on supporting the growth of quality teaching and learning in our schools. One of the requests from the group was that SACRE clarify and provide support for Collective Worship in schools. As a result we undertook a review of the SACRE guidance and organised a training event on Collective Worship for teachers, governors and members of SACRE.

A review of our membership identified a lack of representation from the Sikh, Orthodox Christian and Pentecostal Christian communities as well as a need to increase the representation from teachers.

The development of the RE Hubs website connecting teachers to speakers, places to visit and support groups across London is most welcome. It is hoped that we can encourage local places of worship and speakers in the borough to register.

SACRE advised the LA that a change be made to appoint the Humanist representative from Group D to Group A in response to a recent High Court judgement (Bowen vs Kent CC).

There were two notable highlights to our meetings. In November, Hasan Bolucek gave a presentation on the faith and practice of the Alivi community (a recent but growing community in the borough).

Sophie Casely and Molly Ryan from Leytonstone School gave a presentation about the journey they had made developing the Key stage 3 curriculum. They gave examples of lessons exploring different themes and skills and demonstrated the use of "lenses" to develop critical thinking.

The meeting received a briefing on the Ofsted subject report "Deep and Meaningful" which outlines some of the challenges that we need to consider in the coming year.

As always, I need to add my thanks and admiration to the members of SACRE for the time and energy that they have given to our work. I am particularly grateful for the support of Ruth Kaufman and Is'Haaq Jasat throughout the year.

1.2. The local context

The community of the London Borough of Waltham Forest is culturally and

socially diverse. Many people have travelled across the globe to come and make their home among us. This diversity is celebrated in the schools, shops, restaurants, businesses, places of worship and institutions throughout the borough.

The 2021 census shows some changes in the borough over the last 10 years,
The most marked are: an increase in those identifying as "No religion" and a decrease in those identifying as "Christian".

Our school population records pupils coming from over 150 different language backgrounds. This diversity is also reflected in the faiths and beliefs of our community, as well as in the varied cultural traditions of those who identify as followers within the major religious groups.

The borough is served by:

- 53 primary schools (30 maintained, 21 academies. 2 free schools)
- 17 secondary schools (8 maintained, 8 academies. 1 free schools)
- 26th form colleges
- 3 nursery schools (maintained)
- 4 special schools (1 maintained, 3 academies)

Of these schools 11 are schools with a religious character (8 primary & 3 secondary)

1.3. Key priorities for action in 2023-24

The key priorities for action were agreed as:

- Ensure that all teachers of RE have access to training in order to develop their confidence and skills to teach RE effectively.
- Ensure that all schools are provided with information and access to training to help them deliver Collective Worship in a meaningful and appropriate way that meets statutory requirements.
- Improve SACRE impact and effectiveness

2. Religious Education

2.1 Locally Agreed Syllabus

The current agreed syllabus came into effect in September 2021. The results of a previous SACRE survey show that it has been adopted in all maintained community schools and several academies.

Work to support the effective implementation of the syllabus is carried out through the RE Teacher Network. In addition, the teacher meetings offer an opportunity to review the syllabus and consider how it might evolve when considering its renewal in 2026. At the end of the 2024 academic year, SACRE asked schools to fill in a survey about the effectiveness of the syllabus in readiness for beginning the formal review process.

2.2 Standards in RE

KS 4 GCSE Religious Studies 2023 (confirmed results: see appendix B)
16 schools entered students into a Religious Studies full course GCSE at KS4.
Entries were spread across 4 exam boards. The Waltham Forest average point score for those sitting the AQA and Eduqas exams exceeded the national average.

Nationally male students did less well in the subject achieving a lower average points score than females.

Across the LA the participation in the subject at GCSE increased in 2023. 8 schools entered more than 90% of their cohort. Two schools made a notable increase in the percentage of students taking the subject. Leytonstone School increased the percentage of the cohort from 18% in 2022 to 94% in 2023. Likewise, Walthamstow Academy 34% (2022) to 97% in 2023.

SACRE congratulated these schools on their success and progress along with Eden Girls' and Norlington Boys' on their high participation and above average results.

One school entered students into the RS short course.

SACRE noted that two schools continued not offer RS as a GSCE option in 2023.

KS5 A level Religious Studies: 2023 (confirmed results: see appendix B)



The 2023 results showed a significant reduction from the previous year with only 29 entries across the borough. 2022 saw 44 students taking the subject at A level.

OFSTED inspection reports published in 2023-24

Ofsted published reports on 30 schools in the borough. 2 schools were graded as "Outstanding", 26 as "Good" and 2 as "Requires Improvement".

In the inspections made only 5 included a "deep dive" into the provision and quality of RE. Comments from the reports included:

"Pupils visit different places of worship and visiting speakers share their knowledge of other faiths with them. These experiences encourage pupils to understand and respect different beliefs and customs." [primary]

"The school gives considerable thought and care to pupils' personal development. Pupils are taught about different faiths, beliefs and lifestyles. "[primary]

"The school encourages pupils to consider the views of others. For example, in religious education, Year 6 pupils learn about different beliefs and experiences and why people have differing perspectives. These experiences help pupils to develop their own ideas." [primary]

"Leaders have introduced positive changes that have made the curriculum more ambitious. For example, religious education is taught with more detail." [secondary]

2.3 Support for Teaching & Learning

RE Teacher Network Meetings

During the academic year, 3 Subject Network meetings were held, which is an increase on the last 2 years. The first took placed on Wednesday 20th September 2023. The main focus was on activities promoting engagement and high quality questioning by pupils in the RE classroom. At this meeting, attendees were also able to find out more about support for teaching Humanism in the borough and the Faith and Belief Forum's school linking programme, including how to participate in this, as the group were joined by Ruth Kaufman (Humanist rep on SACRE) and Alejandra Cáceres-Sánchez (Programmes Officer at the Faith and Belief Forum).

The second meeting was held on Thursday 29th February. This began with short slots from guests Stacey Burman (London RE Hub Lead) who explained how the hubs initiative could benefit schools, followed by Alejandra Cáceres-Sánchez to give an update on the linking programme and what schools needed to do in order to be a part of the programme for the following academic year. The main part of the meeting was presented by Stephen Pett from RE Today Services who



helped attendees to explore how to consolidate pupils' learning in RE and look at how cognitive neuroscience can help us shape teaching and learning in the subject.

Wednesday 12th June saw the final meeting of the year in which the group focused on RE and assessment. The group concentrated on assessment tasks which were meaningful for pupils and appropriate to their ages and stages.

The Waltham Forest network currently works well as a cross phase group, with both primary and secondary teachers attending and sharing ideas. It is generally led by two advisers; one a primary specialist (Julia Diamond-Conway) and one a secondary specialist (Angela Hill) so that the meeting can split into groups by age of pupils taught where necessary. In order to meet the needs of staff, the meetings include discussions on which CPD people would find most useful; these are always taken into account when the next meeting is planned.

The positive support by teachers to the twilight network meetings encourages us to plan ahead for a daytime conference in the Autumn Term next year. This is planned to cover training sessions for teachers, as well as an opportunity to review the strengths of the current Agreed Syllabus ahead of the formal process of consultation.

2.4 Curriculum resources and teacher support

SACRE has purchased several resources for schools. These include artefacts for all secondary schools to help teaching staff demonstrate diversity within Christianity and books of teaching ideas to help secondary teachers deliver high quality RE lessons. For most primary schools, a set to help teach about Diwali has been purchased.

Where more appropriate, schools with primary age pupils have been bought non-fiction books for pupils on Hindu traditions. These resources will be distributed to schools at the conference for teachers and subject leaders of RE planned for the Autumn Term 2024.

2.5 Complaints about RE

SACRE has a role in investigating complaints against schools in relation to RE and Collective Worship. In 2022-23 there were no such formal complaints reported.

2.6 Withdrawal from RE

Currently we do not have data to indicate the number of students that have been formally withdrawn from RE lessons.

3. Collective Worship

3.1 Guidance to schools



Due to the results of the previous year's survey of schools, Collective Worship was highlighted as a priority for this academic year. Schools were invited to a free CPD session on Collective Worship and consulted about SACRE's new Collective Worship guidance. The guidance was subsequently published and indications from this year's survey are that schools are now meeting their statutory duty with regards to Collective Worship more often, but not necessarily at all times.

3.2 Determinations

SACRE has a statutory role in considering and granting determinations under The Education Reform Act of 1988. No such requests were made this year. The Adviser to SACRE is always available to assist Headteachers in respect of any request.

4. Links with other bodies

We have been working with the Faith and Belief Forum to encourage more schools to take up the offer of the "Linking schools" project

A number of SACRE members are active members of the Waltham Forest Faith and Belief Forum

Safeguarding is a standard item on all our agenda and all members are now familiar with the duties as set out in "Keeping Children safe in Education"2.

SACRE advised the LA that a change should be made to appoint the Humanist representative from Group D to Group A in response to a recent High Court judgement (Bowen vs Kent CC).

1.7. School workforce data

SACRE expressed concern that some schools in the borough had not submitted any data with regard to hours teaching RE in the annual workforce survey 2023.

The LA agreed to contact those schools and discover the meaning behind the lack of data.

1.8. Schools not entering students for GCSE RE

SACRE expressed concern that 2 maintained secondary schools had not entered any students for GCSE RE in 2022 despite it being a requirement of the Agreed Syllabus that an exam option is offered.

The LA agreed to contact those schools for an explanation.

7. Organization of SACRE

1.9. Meetings and attendance

The SACRE had a programme of 6 meetings across the year: Most. meetings were conducted online. However, the return to an in-person meeting in the summer term was warmly welcomed by members.
