This has been an exciting year for Cumbria SACRE with the start of a new project (see section 5) and record attendance at RE events, especially the Cumbria SACRE primary RE annual conference, RE training for school governors and a new CPD titled Leading and Developing RE – a post Covid-19 response. Although it has continued to be an extremely challenging time for schools during the pandemic, the increased use of online platforms for training and meetings has enabled much greater contact with RE teachers across Cumbria.

Cumbria SACRE said a sad farewell and huge gratitude to David Pitkeathly this term, who is re-locating to West Sussex. He has been a member of Committee A for 12 years, representing the Church of Scotland. David has always been an active member on Cumbria SACRE, contributing to working groups, conferences, interfaith activities and the RE Teachers in Cumbria Facebook group.

- Continue to raise profile and involvement in National Association for SACRE and other national RE organisations.
- Continued involvement with Cumbria Development Education Centre, including virtual visits for religion and worldviews
- Continue to engage with RE teachers across Cumbria
- Encourage individual SACRE members to include SACRE in any community cohesion work they do.
- Begin to consider the revision of the Agreed Syllabus and the transition to a new LA Officer

Religious Education Quality Mark – REQM

Schools can apply for three levels of the REQM award. A school's evidence and provision are assessed by an external assessor, against nationally recognised criteria. Cumbria SACRE encourages all schools to access the REQM assessment materials to use as an audit tool, even if they feel the time and cost of full accreditation is not an immediate priority. See http://www.reqm.org/ Gold Award holders in Cumbria are: Dowdales School, The Queen Katherine School and Bridekirk Dovenby CofE School. Please note that due to Covid-19, there are different measures in place for assessments.

3. A section on CW

Collective Worship in community schools

SACRE has published Guidance to Schools on Collective Worship, to support schools in their statutory responsibility to deliver daily acts of Collective Worship. Cumbria SACRE also provides a section on Collective Worship for community schools as part of school governor training. Cumbria SACRE is investigating the possibility to be involved in a Collective Worship project with the University of Cumbria.

Determinations - To allow any exception to the law that Collective Worship be broadly or mainly Christian

SACRE has received no requests for a determination for exemption from the law.

SACRE hears any complaints brought to the LA about RE and collective worship. No complaints from parents were received this year.

SACRE has developed strong links with Cumbria Development Education Centre (CDEC) and Culham St Gabriel's Trust.

5. A section on other areas of SACRE involvement locally

Virtual Voices in RE project – Autumn 2020 saw the application and news we had been successful with our funding bid to Culham St Gabriel's Trust. We were awarded £10,000 to develop the Voices in Religious Education (VVRE) project in conjunction with Cumbria Development Education Centre (CDEC). During Inter Faith Week 2020, we carried out a pilot phase where several members of Cumbria SACRE filmed a series of recordings about their beliefs. These were viewed by all pupils and staff from two large secondary schools in South Cumbria, with helpful feedback from our two Cumbria SACRE secondary members. The VVRE project has enabled us to raise the profile of Cumbria SACRE nationally through regular events organised by Culham St Gabriel's with other grantees. It has also given the opportunity for Cumbria SACRE members to develop knowledge and understanding of the national landscape of RE, particularly around 'religion and worldviews', and engage with the Ofsted Research Review. Through the project, we are starting to build an enthusiastic community of religious and non-religious 'voices' from across Cumbria who are willing to engage with local schools. This has been a valuable experience for members of Cumbria SACRE to be part of. Teachers have been introduced to the VVRE Project through RE CPD, the Cumbria SACRE RE primary conference and RE network meetings. We look forward to involving schools in specific events and activities next year.
