We are extremely fortunate to receive expert support and guidance from Stephen Pett, National RE Adviser with RE Today, and we benefit greatly from his in-depth knowledge and understanding of religious education and his tireless work.

As Gloucestershire SACRE we are committed to promoting and supporting high quality RE in Gloucestershire schools and to this end, the last year has had a strong focus on the review and design of a new agreed syllabus for Gloucestershire. This has been a huge undertaking, and we have drawn on the expertise and views of our members, taken in to account the national updates as well as canvassing the opinions of stakeholders to ensure their views have been heard.

We are entering an exciting time as our new syllabus is due to be launched in the summer term 2025. A great deal of consideration has been given to recent developments in RE and the shift to include worldviews. Our new syllabus takes account of the Handbook for curriculum writers, Developing a Religion and Worldviews approach in Religious Education in England, 2024 and is being written with the needs of our children, and the needs of those educating them, at the forefront to ensure our young people have access to high quality religious education in Gloucestershire.

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1. Introduction

1.1. Overview of the work of SACRE

- 1.1.1. The Standing Advisory Council on Religious Education (SACRE) is a statutory body set up to advise the Local Authority on matters related to religious education and collective worship. Its members are drawn from teachers, Local Authority representatives including Councillors, faith representatives from the Church of England and a range of Christian denominations, and representatives from other religious and non-religious groups represented in the region.
- 1.1.2. SACRE's key functions include monitoring the provision and quality of RE, and providing advice and support on the effective teaching of RE in accordance with the agreed syllabus. This includes advice on methods of teaching, choice of teaching material and provision of teacher training. This is primarily done through the review and implementation of the locally agreed syllabus, a process which is required every five years. This is followed by on-going monitoring of its effectiveness in the light of changing national education policy.
- 1.1.3. It is a legislative requirement that each SACRE produces an annual report of its work and that this is published, sent to the local authority, to NASACRE and to other interested parties such as the Department for Education.
- 1.1.4. This year, SACRE has been engaged in the on-going process of developing a new agreed syllabus, for launch in 2025. It held three meetings of the Agreed Syllabus Conference followed by SACRE at Sir Thomas Rich's School, Oxleaze, Gloucester Tuesday 7 November 2023, Friday 15 March 2024 and Friday 5 July 2024. All three meetings were hybrid, with the in-person meeting at the school also accessible via Teams.
- 1.1.5. The Chair is Matthew Morgan, Headteacher at Sir Thomas Rich's School and representative for ASCL. He moves to another school for September 2024. The role of Chair will be Julia Matson, Headteacher at Barnwood Park Primary School. The Local Authority Officer is Teresa Cross, Education Lead, Education Outcomes and Intervention.

2. Religious Education (RE)

2.1. The locally agreed syllabus and RE in schools

- 2.1.1. The Gloucestershire agreed syllabus was launched in 2017. It set out a pedagogy based on three elements: enabling pupils to make sense of beliefs, understand their impact in people's lives, and make connections between their studies and their own understanding of the world and of themselves. Feedback from schools has been very positive. The Agreed Syllabus Conference was established in February 2021 for review. One decision taken was to extend the current 2017-2022 syllabus to 2025. This was partly to take into account the challenge of the pandemic, with its impact on how much RE time has realistically been given during lockdowns and during catchup. This meant that the syllabus would not have had its full five-year use. A second reason was to allow for more progress in the RE Council's Religion and Worldviews Project (final report published May 2024), so that it could inform the review.
- 2.1.2. Feedback was sought from teachers at the annual conferences. The initial plan was to apply the Religion and Worldviews (RW) approach as set out in the Draft Handbook (2022) and then the final Handbook for Curriculum Writers (2024) to the 2017 syllabus. That is, to adapt the current syllabus to a new approach. However, in 2024 SACRE agreed that this would result in a hybrid that would not best serve

the interests of pupils or teachers, and so the SACRE agreed to apply an approach that fulfils the RE Council's National Statement of Entitlement (NSE) directly, building a pedagogy around the elements of the NSE: content, engagement, position. The launch will take place in summer 2025.

2.2. Standards and monitoring of RE

- 2.2.1. GCSE and A level Religious Studies examinations data can be seen in Appendix 3 below. At present, exam results from 2024 are unvalidated. SACRE thanks teachers who have supported students and taught them in extremely difficult circumstances.
- 2.2.2. SACRE regularly reviews school workforce survey data when it is available, reviewing school websites and surveying schools to explore provision further.
- 2.2.3. Ofsted reports can also provide a way of monitoring RE. The new Ofsted inspection framework and RE research review appear to be bringing a renewed focus on RE in schools where RE was struggling to get sufficient curriculum time.

2.3. Teacher training and materials and advice for schools

Network meetings

- 2.3.1. The Diocese of Gloucester runs online and face to face hub groups for primary schools, run by hub leaders who are supported with training by the Diocesan adviser, Debbie Helme. The groups meet termly and are attended by teachers from Church of England schools and community schools and academies. The Diocese runs its own annual art competition. As well as the hub groups, the Diocese provides training sessions on:
 - Preparing for SIAMS Inspections
 - Subject leadership in RE
 - Collective Worship
 - Spirituality
 - Responding to bereavement

SACRE primary RE conference, 1 July 2024

2.3.2. The annual primary RE conference took place in person at Puckrup Hall. 115 teachers attended, along with SACRE members. It was led by Stephen Pett, Lat Blaylock and Fiona Moss from RE Today. Ruth Flanagan from University of Exeter did the keynote address.

2.3.4. 90 teachers gave feedback. 94% rated the day as 'excellent' and 6% as 'good'.

Representative feedback included:

- 2.3.5. Teacher evaluations included details of what they planned to do as a result of the conference, some requests for future training. One of the seminars (Case studies in Islam) included draft units for the 2025 syllabus, and the final keynote set out the plans for the religion and worldviews approach to be taken in the syllabus. Both sessions gave teachers the opportunity for detailed feedback, which has been used in the review.

SACRE Three Counties secondary RE conference, 25 June 2024

2.3.6. Gloucestershire SACRE collaborates with Herefordshire and Worcestershire SACREs in putting on a secondary conference each year. The venue was Puckrup Hall Hotel near Tewkesbury. 30 delegates attended from the three counties.

2.3.8. Representative feedback included:

2.4. REaction award

2.4.1. Gloucestershire SACRE has been running it REaction award for four years now. It celebrates high quality RE in schools, with teachers demonstrating the impact of visits and visitors on pupils, involvement in a competition beyond the school (such as NATRE's Spirited Arts, and the impact of CPD on teachers. In 2023-2024, 6 schools have achieved the Bronze award, and 1 school has achieved the Silver award. At least 7 schools who achieved Bronze in previous year are applying for Silver in 2024-2025. The criteria for Gold are being established and schools will be able to apply in 2024-2025. SACRE representative, David Crunkhurn, has advertised the award at headteacher meetings, subject leader network meetings, and visited two schools to help them with their applications.

2.5. Other information

- 2.5.1. There were no formal complaints to SACRE about RE during the year.

3. Collective worship

- 3.1. Standards and monitoring of collective worship
 - 3.1.1. SACRE has found it hard to monitor collective worship over the past few years.

3.2. Determinations

3.2.1. No applications for a determination (to alter the character of collective worship for some or all pupils in a school) have been requested in the year 2023-24.

3.3. Teacher training provided

3.3.1. No SACRE training on collective worship has been provided in 2023-24, although the Diocese of Gloucester continues to support its schools in this area.

3.4. Other information

- 3.4.1. There were no formal complaints to SACRE about collective worship during the year.
- 3.5. Advice given to the local authority
 - 3.5.1. No advice was given to the local authority.

4. Links with other bodies

4.1. National bodies

 Gloucestershire SACRE is a member of NASACRE. Its newsletters are circulated to all members. Stephen Pett, adviser to SACRE, and Professor Trevor Cooling, Committee B, presented a workshop on the Worldviews Project to NASACRE members in February 2022.

- Stephen Pett, RE Today, connects SACRE with NATRE, and provides national updates at each meeting. Reports from NATRE, including the School Workforce Data and regular primary and secondary surveys have proved useful to SACRE when monitoring schools.
- Information from the RE Council has been used in meetings and shared with schools where appropriate.
- The REC Religion and Worldviews Project Handbook for Curriculum Writers on a religion and worldviews approach (May 2024) has been a helpful resource for discussion for SACRE, and in the shaping of the syllabus review.

Several SACRE members attend the primary conference each year, providing support to the RE adviser and spending time meeting and supporting teachers. Members often attend NASACRE CPD and the SouthWest SACRE conference, reporting back to members.
