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SECTION 1: INTRODUCTION AND OVERVIEW

1.1 CHAIRMAN'S INTRODUCTION

I am pleased to be able to introduce the Bexley SACRE Annual Report for the academic year 2014 / 2015.

With the limited resources available to us, and ever aware of the demands we sometimes place on some of our members who give their time and expertise voluntarily, a decision was previously made to reduce the number of meetings each year from four to three. Bexley's SACRE managed to meet twice in the year, in November 2014 and in March 2015.

In the year in question, the SACRE were delighted to be able to review some more excellent GCSE, AS and A level results achieved by Bexley students in 2014. It pleases me, on behalf of the SACRE, to be able congratulate our students on their results. The Borough's RE Heads of Department and their teaching staff also merit a thank you for the excellent results they have achieved in what continues to be an uncertain time for their subject, although some recent reviews and announcements suggest stability may be forthcoming for the subject and those that teach it.

I am pleased to report that the new agreed syllabus for Religious Education in Bexley was rolled out to schools in September 2014. So far, the feedback received has been largely positive and I look forward to receive ongoing reports of areas that are working well.

The SACRE works hard to establish and maintain connections with the wider community and we were pleased to receive a presentation from Bexley's Christian Teaching charity, CRIBS. I extend my particular thanks to Mr Gordon Raggett who outlined the excellent programmes run by CRIBS, including Living Values and B:You. The children who participate are rewarded with real responsibility and thus benefit greatly from the experience.

The SACRE also recognises the importance of working towards Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural development (SMSC) and received a presentation from Helen Burdon regarding its importance. I would like to thank colleagues on behalf of the SACRE for highlighting the need to strengthen links between RE and SMSC going forward.

Looking ahead, I am keen to raise the profile of SACRE and the important work it does within the Borough. We will continue to maintain our working relationships with our schools and hopefully forge new ones with faith groups and centres across Bexley. We will also continue to monitor and, where necessary, correspond on and debate any relevant RE matters, be they of local or national relevance, and we will place a particular focus upon the progress of the new syllabus.

In conclusion, I extend my thanks to the SACRE members who have departed, and extend a warm welcome to our new members. I am always conscious that the

SACRE could not function without the dedication and input of our members, who give their time voluntarily.

1.2 OVERVIEW

Bexley SACRE met on two occasions during the past year:

26 November 2014 19 March 2015

We are part way through a self-assessment process, from which evolved a development plan to guide our work. We continue to work to that plan.

The new syllabus for Religious Education in Bexley was introduced to schools in September 2014. Progress will continue to be monitored throughout the next few academic years, with the possible establishment of a working group devoted to the purpose.

We were delighted once again to be able to welcome the excellent GCSE, GCE A and AS level results achieved by students in Bexley in 2014.

An increasing concern is once again our ability to retain and maintain a stable membership. Numbers have increased in the last few years, with a notable increase to Group C. There are, however, a number of vacancies in Group A, detailed on page 13 of this report, which places even more expectation on those that remain and who, we must not forget, give their time voluntarily. It also leaves certain denominations and religions present in Bexley, unrepresented on the SACRE.

This annual report has been signed off by the SACRE membership. It will be made available to Head Teachers, the RE department heads and RE co-ordinators in all the Borough's schools.

SECTION 2: RELIGIOUS EDUCATION AND THE LOCALLY AGREED SYLLABUS

2.1 The locally Agreed Syllabus

Historically, the Bexley Agreed Syllabus has been fully embedded into the local curriculum and we have no reason to believe that schools were not finding it to be a useful framework for the teaching of Religious Education in the Borough. Feedback from teachers on the SACRE indicated that the Syllabus was well known in their schools and that teachers had well established plans in schools that enabled the Syllabus to be taught.

As reported previously, mindful of our statutory duty to ensure that the Syllabus is reviewed every five years, and after consulting our members, an Agreed Syllabus Conference was convened in 2012. Comprising representatives of the SACRE, the local authority and teachers who were not SACRE members, the Conference successfully developed a new agreed syllabus.

The intention was for the statutory element of the new Syllabus to be available in hard copy and as an online resource, with the non-statutory elements predominantly web based and available via a number of media, such as Bexley Fronter etc. This approach would enable quick and efficient response to feedback and the addition of new and / or updated non-statutory material.

The syllabus was formally launched on 11th July 2014 at a well-attended event. It was introduced to schools in September 2014. Progress will be monitored by SACRE, with any issues to be addressed by members.

2.2 Teacher training and teaching materials

The local authority provided a selection of workshops during the new syllabus launch event which served to introduce teachers to the new content. They were also introduced to the website containing the non-statutory materials.

Three subject leader's network meetings were held throughout the year, the first on 17th October 2014, with two further meetings in February and June 2015.

The World Religion sessions, led by Chislehurst and Sidcup Grammar School and supported by the local authority began in September 2014 and continued until January 2015.

There are also plans to include SACRE in the SMSC development meetings, due to the importance of SACRE's role in advising schools on the matter.

Governor training is scheduled throughout 2015/2016.

2.3 Examination results

The 2015 Religious Studies examination results for Bexley are summarised in paragraph 2.5.2 below. We will discuss these in our meeting at the end of 2015.

There is a report in the next paragraph on the discussions the SACRE membership had about the 2014 results.

A detailed breakdown of Bexley's results is attached as Appendix B.

2.3.1 Bexley Religious Studies GCSE, AS and A Level Results 2014

As we do every year, the SACRE discussed the 2014 Religious Studies GCSE, AS and A Level examination results for Bexley and England.

The SACRE welcomed another good year for Bexley students and noted that the results were roughly consistent with previous years. In particular the SACRE commented on the fact that there had been an increase of GCSE Full Course entrants bringing the total up to a similar number seen in 2012. The reverse trend was seen in Short Course, however, with a 62% decrease in entrants.

2.3.2 National Religious Studies GCSE, AS and A Level results 2015¹

The 2015 Religious Studies examination results for Bexley, with comparison data for previous years and national results, is presented in paragraph 2.3.3 below.

352,845 students in England sat a Religious Studies examination in 2015. This is an increase of 96,070 students, or 37% from the entries in 2014.

269,248 students sat the GCSE Full Course nationally, an increase of 28,848 on 2014 or 12%.

At 30,507 national AS Level entries increased by 2% from 29, 889 in 2014. The number of entries was very similar to that in 2013.

National A Level entries were also similar to 2014, continuing the gradual rise seen since 2009 with 21,313 entries.

In 2015, 72.2% of GCSE Full Course entrants in England achieved a A*-C grade, which was a slight increase from 70.1% in 2014. The pass rate between A* - G was 97.9%.

At AS Level, 92.1% of entrants achieved an A-E result, which was a slight increase from 86.4% in 2013. 43.1% achieved an A-B result, which was a significant increase on 2014's 27% result.

At A Level, 54.5% of entrants in England achieved an A*-B results, which was a slight increase on the 51.5% result in 2014. 98.9% achieved an A*-E result, which was an slight decrease from the 99.8% result in 2014.

2.3.3. Results in Bexley

2,516 students sat a Religious Studies examination in Bexley in 2015. This was a reduction of 358 students from 2014 or a 12% decrease in entrants.

2,066 students sat the GCSE Full Course, 222 students sat the GCSE Short Course, 139 students sat the AS Level examination and there were 89 entrants A Level.

The number of students who sat the GCSE Full Course examination decreased by 3%, from 2,130 entrants in 2014 to 2,066 in 2015. The number that sat the Short Course dropped from 518 to 222, which is a reduction of 57%. AS Level entries in Bexley increased by 15%, with 21 more students sitting the exam in 2014. There was a small increase in A Level entrants, with numbers rising by 14% from 76 to 89 entrants.

Regarding results, there was a 2.1% increase in A*-C results in GCSE Full Course this year, with 78.9% achieving a pass. This was higher than the national average, which stood at 71.8%. The Short Course results saw a significant decrease in results, with only 19.8% of entrants achieving an A*-C grade compared to 40.7% in the previous year.

There was an increase in A-B results at AS Level, with 48.2% achieving this in 2015, compared to 45.8% in 2014. There was, however, a slight decrease in results at A Level, with 49.4% achieving A*-B in 2015 compared to 57.3% in 2014.

It is worth noting that with the Bexley GCSE Short Course, AS and A Level cohort being quite small, any difference in the data from one year to the next can sometimes represent a large percentage change. Summary tables of the results for Bexley are attached at Appendix A, together with some comparison graphs for data for England. More detailed, school level, data is provided in Appendix B to this report.

SECTION 3: COLLECTIVE WORSHIP AND PROVISION FOR PUPILS' PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

3.1 Monitoring

The SACRE's role is to monitor the quality of Collective Worship in local schools.

As reported previously, and following an extensive review, the SACRE concluded that Collective Worship appeared to be inclusive, varied and of benefit to students, and that no further work was required to promote it. That view did not change in the current reporting period.

3.2 Training and advice

There are plans to include SACRE in the SMSC development meetings, due to the importance of SACRE's role in advising schools on the matter.

Governor training is scheduled throughout 2015/16.

3.3 Determinations and complaints

No determinations were applied for, and the SACRE received no formal complaints about collective worship.

SECTION 4: BEXLEY SACRE: WORKING ARRANGEMENTS AND LINKS WITH OTHER AGENCIES

4.1 **Professional and administrative support**

Meetings of the SACRE are attended by a senior officer from the local authority's Directorate of Education and Social Care and an officer of the Committee Services and Scrutiny team of the local authority clerks the SACRE meetings and acts as the point of contact for individual members. Bexley SACRE has a part-time Adviser from Rochester Diocese.

4.2 Development of the SACRE

4.2.1 SACRE training

Despite financial constraints, SACRE members are encouraged to attend national and regional events and to report back to subsequent SACRE meetings. For instance, the Vice Chairman continued to give members informative feedback from the RE Subject Leader's meetings scheduled throughout the year. SACRE members also discuss any available annual analysis of the previous year's SACRE reports, and compare the national picture with the local context.

4.3 Finance

The SACRE receives no independent funding, although we are grateful to have access to a small allocation from the local authority's curriculum development budget should the need arise for a limited number of conference delegate fees, for example, and our NASACRE membership fee.

4.4 Membership and Constitution

Although maintaining a strong membership is an ongoing concern for SACRE, in current view it is quite strong. Groups B and C are full to requirement which is positive, although there remain vacancies in Group A.

Despite actively pursuing to fill the vacancies in Group A, it is becoming increasingly difficult to do so, with a number of local and national organisations either unable to offer a nominee, or appearing unwilling to do so. Fewer members means there is even more expectation on those that remain and who, we must not forget, give their time voluntarily.

The terms of office for all Bexley SACRE members in Groups A to C inclusive will end in May 2018, although some may be subject to renewal thereafter. The membership was most recently reviewed in May 2014.

The SACRE Constitution was reviewed three years ago, and there was no reason to review it again in the period of this report.

4.5 National

Bexley SACRE is a member of the National Association of SACREs (NASACRE).

4.6 Local

Bexley SACRE works in collaboration with the local Diocesan Boards.

The CRIBS group (Christian Resources in Bexley Schools) is represented on the SACRE and presented to the group in March 2015.

The North West Kent Muslim Association, who are represented on SACRE, graciously offered to host a SACRE meeting at Crayford Mosque in November 2013, which was well received by members.

The Redeemed Christian Church of Bethel's Court presented their work to SACRE in July 2014, which was informative for all members.

Several meetings of the Agreed Syllabus Conference were held at Brampton Primary School, who kindly offered their facilities as a venue.


