


# SACRE REPORT

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## **Introduction**

Three meetings of Oldham SACRE took place at 2 secondary schools and one faith centre (Failsworth School, and Oasis Academy Limeside, Failsworth Salvation Army Citadel respectively). Meetings at these venues gave insights into the work of each of the centres and their relationship to religious education, faiths and denominations in Oldham.

## **Support for maintaining standards in RE**

Throughout 2013-2014 academic year, support for RE in Oldham was provided by a consultant, funded for 10 days by the Council. Consultant support was provided by an RE professional who had supported SACRE for several years. Tasks included, convening and chairing teacher network meetings, leading training sessions on RE for schools, reporting to SACRE, helping to organise events such as Conferences and Network meetings, monitoring provision and standards in schools and developing strategies to encourage schools to review provision for RE in the light of developments and changes with the new curriculum and the implementation of a new syllabus.

The key messages in the Agreed Syllabus for Religious Education launched, in 2013 for implementation in 2014, were; the importance of knowledge and understanding, reflecting and responding and enquiring and working creatively as a basis for lively religious education.

Additionally, Oldham Association of Secondary Headteachers has provided extra resources for supporting the maintenance of standards. Their representative, Ms Lesley Parry has attended SACRE regularly. SACRE has also received support from Primary school headteachers.

Teachers do not generally report directly to SACRE on a regular basis, they have liaised with the consultant electronically through the “FIRST CLASS network” and have provided ongoing mutual specialist support to colleagues in schools through the “First Class” RE Conference Website. The SACRE was keen to explore the way in which subject networks for RE in both phases could be energised in the light of the overall changes to curriculum provision in order to secure the spreading of best practice and challenging schemes of work



## **Annual Conference 2013 and launch of the Agreed Syllabus**

Oldham Council supported a conference for religious education practitioners, school governors and members of SACRE at Oldham's Civic Centre which was well attended by over 70+ professionals and provided an ideal opportunity to launch the new Agreed Syllabus as well as workshop opportunities. The sessions included a keynote speech from Alan Brine HMI and an overview of Oldham's new Agreed Syllabus from Lat Blaylock (REToday). The performance of the choir from Bare Trees Primary School and presentation by the RE Ambassadors from Holy Cross Primary made a significant impact on the conference members. The workshops were popular and evaluations indicated a desire for more opportunities for professional development in the future.

1020 pupils completed a full course in GCSE Religious Studies in 2013 which is an **increase** on the 2012 figure of 987. The percentage of pupils achieving A\*-C **increased** from 72% in 2012 to 76.1% in 2013

The difference between the percentage of girls achieving Grade A\*-C and boys achieving Grade A\*-C was 9.6%. The gap between boys and girls at Grades A\*-C widened in 2013

The gap between boy and girls achieving Grade A\*-G also widened in 2013 to 3.2% and the number of pupils achieving Grade A\*-G declined to 97.2% from 97.8% in 2012

The percentage of pupils not awarded a grade in 2013 increased from 2.2% in 2012 to 2.8% in 2013

791 pupils completed a short course in GCSE Religious Studies in 2013. This was an increase on the figure of 766 in 2012

The percentage of pupils achieving Grade A\*-C declined in 2013 from 42.4% in 2012 to 41.7% in 2013. There has been a declining trend since 2010 when those A\*-C were 49.7% of the eligible cohort.

The difference between the percentage of girls achieving A\*-c and boys achieving Grade A\*-C was 13% which is an increase of 0.2% on the previous year.

The percentage of boys and girls achieving Grade A\*-C in 2013 declined from the Grades achieved in 2012.

The percentage of pupils achieving Grade A\*-G declined in 2013 and the gap between boys and girls widened from 7.4% to 7.8% in 2013.

The percentage of pupils achieving no grade in 2013 was 14.2% an increase on the previous year (12.1%).

### **Entry Level 2013**

One school entered 7 pupils for Entry Level Qualification in Religious Studies in 2013.

The figure has fallen from 43 pupils in 2009 to 7 pupils in 2013. The percentage achieving above Level 1 was 100% with 85.7% achieving Level 3.
