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CHAIR'S INTRODUCTION

This year 2016/17 saw the adoption and early phase of implementation of Portsmouth's Agreed Syllabus Living Difference III. We were delighted to review and revise the Agreed Syllabus alongside other neighbouring authorities, including for the first time Isle of Wight, who joined with Hampshire, Southampton, and Portsmouth. All four authorities have adopted Living Difference III for their schools during the period of this report.

We have continued to participate in regional and national RE meetings and events, and we have also followed with interest the work of the Commission on RE during this period.

As in previous years we thank Patricia Hannam and now also Justine Ball, as inspector/advisers in Hampshire for their support of Religious Education in Portsmouth. Patricia Hannam became SACRE adviser in January 2017 preparing for our SACRE meeting in March 2017 meeting following Stephen Horsman who advised SACRE between August 2016 and January 2017. We are especially grateful for the continued support of our clerk, Peter Smith-Parkyn during this period.

We are looking forward to enabling continued work with teachers; ensuring children in Portsmouth have access to some of the best Religious Education possible, as the implementation of Living Difference III proceeds. We anticipate continuing our partnership with Hampshire, Southampton, and now the Isle of Wight, and the support of regional initiatives such as the South Central SACRE Hub.

Again, sincere thanks to all who work so hard to support RE in Portsmouth and especially to all the members of the Portsmouth SACRE.

SECTION 1: INFORMATION ABOUT SACRE

1.1 Duty to establish a SACRE

Since the Education Reform Act of 1988, all Local Education Authorities (LAs) have been required by law to constitute a Standing Advisory Council for Religious Education (SACRE) within their local area.¹

1.2 What does a SACRE do?

SACRE is a unique body; it is set up by the LA but is independent of it, with the role to give advice to that LA. The law states that Religious Education must be taught in all maintained schools² and a SACRE's role is to advise what needs to be done to improve religious education (RE) and collective worship for schools in its area.

The main purpose of the annual report is to hold the LA to account, by informing the Secretary of State and key partners what advice SACRE gave the LA during the year and how the LA responded to that advice. This includes advice on Religious Education and Collective Worship in those schools for which the LA has responsibility.

1.3 Composition of SACRE

There are four groups or committees, as below:

A: The Christian denominations and other religious denominations, reflecting the principal religious traditions of the area.

B: The Church of England

- C: Teacher and head teacher associations
- D: The Local Authority

The Local Authority has determined that the SACRE should comprise of:

- Fifteen members of other religious groups.
- Four representatives of the Church of England.
- Six representatives of teachers' associations.
- Four elected members.

Other members may be co-opted from time to time as appropriate for all or part meetings

1.4 Membership of SACRE

The names of the SACRE members and the religious denominations for Group A can be found at Appendix A.

1.5 SACRE Functions

- To advise the LA on collective worship and the Religious Education to be given in accordance with the agreed syllabus including methods of teaching, advice on materials and the provision of training for teachers
- To consider whether to recommend to the LA that its current agreed syllabus should be reviewed by convening an Agreed Syllabus Conference.
- To consider whether the requirement that religious worship in a county school should be 'broadly Christian in nature' should be varied (determinations).
- To report to the LA and the Department for Education (DfE) on its activities on an annual basis.

1.6 Meetings and attendance

SACRE is supported by a clerk from the Councils' Democratic Services, as well as a professional adviser who. In the academic year 2016-17 the role was undertaken by Stephen Horsman between August 2016 and January 2017 when Patricia Hannam became adviser to SACRE.

SECTION 2: SUMMARY OF SACRE'S WORK in 2016/17

2.1 Agreed Syllabus, revision and implementation (see Action Plan point 1)

- The reviewed and revised agreed syllabus *Living Difference III* was adopted by the Agreed Syllabus Conference in October 2016.
- SACRE together with the Local Authority implemented a communication strategy to ensure all schools were aware of Living Difference III and had access to it.

2.2 Meeting Training Needs (see Action Plan point 2)

- A programme of briefing sessions for head teachers and senior leaders as well as for teachers has taken place. In addition to this a series of primary network meetings have been offered to schools.
- SACRE has reflected on the first year of briefing sessions and going forward has a plan to continue raising the profile of Living Difference III across the authority.

2.3 Resourcing Living Difference III (see Action Plan point 3)

- The Primary RE News on-line publication, produced by Hampshire Inspectors has been provided to all Portsmouth schools free of charge during this period. In addition the artefact loan service continues to be made available to schools. Teachers are also aware of the other published resources available to support the teaching of Living Difference III through the Hampshire RE Centre in Winchester.
- SACRE's artefacts collection continues to be maintained by the Ethnic Minority Achievement Service (EMAS). Information relating to the religious and cultural artefacts available to schools from SACRE is available to schools from Portsmouth City Council through EMAS located in the basement room at the Civic Offices. The council's despatch team currently deliver/collect the boxes without charge. 58 boxes were borrowed for 2016/17. EMAS continues to offer support to schools in their appreciation of a range of religions and cultures through Festival and Language Packs.

2.4 Monitoring the effectiveness of the Agreed Syllabus (see Action Plan point 4)

- A SACRE Monitoring group has been convened and now meets once each term some time before presenting a written report to the full SACRE. Terms of reference have been agreed by the full SACRE and the first meeting was held in July 2017. This meeting has the specific purpose of considering a range of data in order to ensure SACRE is well informed about the effectiveness of its Agreed Syllabus *Living Difference III*.
- SACRE Monitoring group has considered Ofsted reports mentioning or alluding to Religious Education
- SACRE monitoring group and full SACRE have considered KS4 data which is included in Appendix E.
- Looking forward a series of Monitoring visits to primary schools has been commissioned and will be reported on in future annual reports.

2.5 Maintaining SACRE Effectiveness (see Action Plan point 5)

- SACRE has met three times during this period
- SACRE has ensured that all four groups are represented at meetings and that meetings have been quorate
- Training was been offered to all SACRE members in September 2016 to ensure all members had the opportunity to familiarise themselves with the approach to Religious

education in Living Difference III prior to the Agreed Syllabus Conference which took place in October 2016.

- Reports have been regularly presented to SACRE to ensure that SACRE is well informed about local and national matters in relation to Religious Education.
- Where members have been able to attend local, regional or national events reports have been presented back to SACRE
- A pre SACRE meeting with the Chair, SACRE Clerk and SACRE Adviser has taken place prior to all SACRE meetings
- SACRE has considered the DfE advice that 'A SACRE ... has within its powers to discuss any matter related to its functions as it sees fit and may therefore include the provision of RE in academies in its discussions or address such matters as may be referred to it. An academy or group of academies can be represented though cooption onto the local SACRE (or indeed any SACRE) if all parties are in agreement'.

2.5 Other Issues:

- **Collective Worship:** It has been agreed that a survey of the position on Collective Worship in Portsmouth schools will be undertaken in the year 2017-18
- SACRE has noted that any academy or free schools in Portsmouth has the
 opportunity to teach religious education using Living Difference III. SACRE is keen to
 ensure that schools that are teaching in accordance with the Agreed Syllabus have
 the opportunity to access high quality training whilst being aware that there are now a
 rapidly increasing number of academies in the authority. SACRE has considered the
 co-option of additional representatives from Portsmouth Academies so that its support
 and influence both reflects and contributes to ensuring high quality RE is received by
 all children and young people in Portsmouth.

SECTION 3: STANDARDS IN RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

3.1 Commentary on GCSE examination results in Religious Studies

This report offers an overview and brief analysis of the 2016 GCSE data available regarding full course GCSE Religious Studies (RS) in Portsmouth. It is important to remember it is difficult to make clear comparisons year on year since it is not the same group of students and not always the same teachers teaching the GCSE being compared. In other words, like is not being compared with like. Therefore results must be considered a year at a time, looking carefully at what this reveals for any one particular year and in order to draw conclusions about any action that should be taken.

Background information

- The GCSE Full Course, called Religious Studies (RS) is in general intended to be a 2 year course sat at the end of year 11, however some schools teach the GCSE RS over three years, beginning in year 9.
- The GCSE is planned to be taught in 120 hours. Usually in two lessons per week over 2 years.
- It is important to note that some schools teach RS GCSE in one lesson per week over two or three years. Usually in these schools teachers are non-specialist teachers.
- Schools which have the best results for RS are those which enable students to access the full time recommendation for the GCSE and to be taught by specialist teachers.

- The existing GCSE was first available for examination in 2011, and is being replaced by a new course which will be available for examination for the first time in 2018.
- Assessment Objectives for the current GCSE Religious Studies course are : AO1 Describe, explain and analyse, using knowledge and understanding 50% AO2 Use evidence and reasoned argument to express and evaluate personal responses, informed insights, and differing viewpoints 50%.
- RS GCSE tests not only knowledge but the capacity to *analyse* and *to use evidence and reasoned argument to express and evaluate*. Teaching must enable students to do this. RS GCSE success is about higher order thinking, not just facts. Challenging children to analyse evaluate and in other ways reason well at KS3 and KS4 is known to raise standards at GCSE.

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Overall findings

- Entries for GCSE Full Course in Portsmouth reveal that out of a cohort in 2016 of 1729, 670 students sat Full course GCSE. A question arising from this is regarding what the other students are doing at KS4 to ensure they are accessing their entitlement to RE during this key stage.
- There has continued to be an upward trend. In 2016 outcomes were slightly above the national result.

Portsmouth SACRE seeks to encourage schools entering young people for GCSE to ensure that adequate time is given to GCSE RS teaching, at least that which is recommended by the examination boards. Further, where GCSE is not taught at KS4, SACRE would want to encourage schools to ensure all students can access a rich religious education curriculum at KS4 that meets the requirements of the Agreed Syllabus and ensures schools meet OFSTED requirements for religious education as set out in the Ofsted Handbook.

A summary of results can be seen in table format at Appendix E.

3.3 Quality of Teaching and Leadership in Religious Education

In addition to monitoring GCSE Full Course results, Portsmouth SACRE seeks to fulfil its duty to monitoring the effectiveness of the Agreed Syllabus in a number of ways.

Although there is rarely specific reporting about Religious Education in Ofsted reports, the newly formed Portsmouth SACRE Monitoring Group has looked at reports where pupils' social, moral, spiritual and cultural development (SMSC) has been noted. In addition to this the group has considered reports where how a school is preparing children for life in modern Britain has been noted. Despite the fact that there is no any necessary link between these judgements and the quality of Religious Education, reports can give an indication of the

quality of provision as frequently religious education will be inferred by this. The introduction of the short inspection for schools already judged as good or better further limits the detail of the commentary that an Ofsted inspection therefore will provide to support SACRE's monitoring responsibility. The full reports are publicly available on the Ofsted website.

Going forward the LA has commissioned a small number of SACRE visits to primary schools in 2017/18 to augment previous visits to secondary schools made some years ago.

SECTION 4: COMPLAINTS ABOUT RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

There have been no formal complaints about Religious Education to SACRE in the past year.

SECTION 5: COLLECTIVE WORSHIP

5.1 Monitoring Collective Worship

Ofsted reports sometime mentioned collective worship in relation to evidencing that a school is promoting children's Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural development and preparing children for life in modern Britain. The SACRE monitoring group will monitor, consider and report on this in future

5.2 Complaints

There have been no complaints about Collective Worship in schools.

5.3 Determinations

No requests for determination have been submitted to SACRE and there are no current determinations for review.

SECTION 6: LINKS WITH OTHER BODIES

6.1 Links with other Authorities and SACREs

Portsmouth retains links with the Hampshire SACRE through members who are on both bodies. During this period SACRE members have been actively working with SACRE members of neighbouring authorities during the revision the Agreed Syllabus, since city schools share *Living Difference III* with schools in neighbouring authorities. Members of Portsmouth SACRE also attend South Central SACRE Hub meetings in Winchester.

6.2 NASACRE

Members of the Portsmouth SACRE were able to attend the 2017 NASACRE national meeting and AGM. NASACRE offers support and guidance to the Portsmouth SACRE.

6.3 South Central RE/SACRE Hub

Portsmouth SACRE members are invited to the South Central Hub meetings where further support and advice, including development of RE research, development of leadership capacity and local support booster courses are discussed. These meetings have not been held during the revision of the agreed syllabus. However, the Chair will attend these meetings which are recommencing in the autumn of 2017.
